Furthermore, AAVs are required to record that they have received this and to retain these records for at least 2 years. | Exporters are not required to submit a variation of their AA to the department to reflect the changes. However, exporters must ensure their AA and operational practices reflects the updated requirements. Any amendments to an AA must be recorded in the exporter's variations register, in accordance with section 1.6 of the Approved arrangement guidelines for the export of livestock. Exporters must keep records that they have provided a copy of the relevant parts of the AEP to the AAV for each consignment. AAVs must ensure they have a process for keeping records that they have received a copy of the relevant parts of the AEP from the exporter for each consignment. |

| Other live animal exporters | Exporters can now request the revocation of a government (health) certificate. | |
