Summary of the Carnarvon WA in-person session

On 19 November 2025, we travelled to Carnarvon, WA to hold an in-person information session on the assessment of alternative measures. Approximately 22 people attended the session.

The session was independently facilitated by Articulous who captured the discussion on paper, including the questions and concerns raised by attendees. Farm visits to Far North Queensland and Carnaryon WA

In late October and November 2025, the Australian Banana Growers' Council facilitated our visit of several banana farms and packhouses:

- On 28 and 29 October, we visited two farms including their packing sheds in Far North Queensland.
- On 19 November, we visited two farms and a packing shed in Carnarvon,
 Western Australia.

These visits were a valuable opportunity for our technical experts to hear directly from growers, observe Australian banana production and biosecurity practices, gain an understanding of the differences in the practices used across the different regions, and ask questions. Several of our technical experts who attended these farm visits will also be undertaking the technical visit to the Philippines in early 2026.

Independent experts

We intend to engage independent experts to review our assessment of alternative measures for bananas from the Philippines where required and at appropriate stages in the process.

If the decision is made to conduct the assessment as a Biosecurity Import Risk Analyses (BIRA), at any stage in the process we may ask the Scientific Advisory Group to review and provide comments on any aspect of the BIRA. (Please note that no decision has been made, and the decision to conduct a BIRA is a decision for the Director of Biosecurity (the Secretary of the department) or the Minister for Agriculture.)

The department's previous Scientific Advisory Group lapsed in May 2025 and the Australian Government is currently <u>advertising</u> for new standing members of the Scientific Advisory Group.

What's next

Early next year we will visit the Philippines to gather information on Philippine commercial production, pest management and export practices for Cavendish bananas.

The next step will be to publish an issues paper that outlines the assessment process in more detail. We expect to publish the issues paper in the first half of 2026. It will provide background information on the Philippines' requests, what will be considered during the assessment and how and when we will engage with stakeholders*.
