

Wine – signs of recovery Q2 2021

Australian wine producers and exporters are diversifying their export markets but the loss of the China market and COVID-19 has seen both the value and volume of Australia's wine exports fall in the first half of 2021.

Wine exports diversify but China continues to leave a big hole

- > Australian wine exports to China peaked at \$1.1b in 2019-20, accounting for 37% of Australia's total wine exports. In 2019-20, Australian wine exported to China received \$8.89/L on average, substantially higher than \$3.90/L average overall.
- > The value of Australia's wine exports has been affected by the loss of the China market and the reduced global demand from the hospitality sector due to COVID-19. The total value of Australian wine exports in Jan-June 2021 were 26% lower on the previous Jan-June 3-year average.
- > The volume of Australian wine exports fell by 20% in 2020-21. This is explained by a combination of reduced production and the potential for wine to be sold or stored in Australia.
- Between Jan and June 2021 Australian wine exports to Hong Kong (130%), Singapore (65%) and Korea (172%) increased markedly (though off a low base). These are encouraging signs, however it will take time to develop brand recognition for Australian wine in alternative markets.

China's total wine imports remain low, France and Chile take market share

- > Between 2018 and 2020, Australia accounted for 32% of the value of China's wine imports. In 2021, France and Chile have taken a larger share of the China wine market.
- > The total value of China's wine market has been falling steadily since 2018. This trend has continued in 2021 with imports between Jan and June 34% below the previous 3-year average.
