# Victorian Weed Spotters





#### **Overview**

- Weed Spotters sits within the High Risk Invasive Plants program at Agriculture Victoria
- The program focuses on State prohibited weeds as the highest category of declared noxious weeds in Victoria under the Catchment and Land Protection Act 1994 (CaLP)
- State prohibited weeds either:
  - do not occur in Victoria or
  - are present in small numbers and can reasonably be expected to be eradicated






#### **Agriculture Victoria Biosecurity Approach**

#### Early Detection: key to eradication

#### Made possible by Weed Spotters

- Early detection finding new infestations before they have established and spread too far
- 2. Delimitation to determine the extent and where it may have spread to
- 3. Planned response assess the site and species
- 4. Monitoring until eradicated occurs regularly





#### Weed Spotters are asked to

- Be observant
- Look out for State prohibited weeds anywhere in Victoria including:
  - Private gardens.
  - Restaurants.
  - Markets.
  - Reserves.
  - Public gardens.
  - Waterways.
  - On-line market places.
- Report sightings to Agriculture Victoria immediately. AGRICULTURE VICTORIA



#### The reporting process

- Ask Weed Spotters to
  - report any suspect State prohibited weeds to Agriculture Victoria
  - take photos
  - record accurate information
  - mark location on a map or provide a street address
  - not destroy or remove the plant

#### Response to Weed Spotter reports

- Photos are usually sufficient to identify reports.
- If a State prohibited weed is identified, then a biosecurity officer will visit the site as soon as possible.
- Once identity is confirmed, the plants will be safely removed by biosecurity officers or a contractor as soon as possible.
- On-going monitoring will then occur for a number of years until the site is eradicated





#### Weed Spotter engagement

- Weed Spotters are supported by:
  - newsletter, three times per year
  - annual wall calendar
  - website
  - training, online and face to face
  - State prohibited weed ID cards





## Weed Spotter time line – establishment of program

- 2006 Officially launched and coordinator role appointed
- 2007 Weed Spotters asked to look for a large list of species and volunteer numbers growing rapidly through training
- 2008 Strategic recruitment plan developed to manage escalation and imbalance across the state and a focus on State prohibited weeds only
- 2010 Recruitment aligned to target affiliations and training and communications products improved
- 2011 Weed Spotter database and web site improved
- 2016 Online training module developed



#### **Key lessons**

- Small group of target species to keep Weed Spotters focussed on the highest priorities
- Strategic Weed Spotter recruitment has resulted in a higher proportion of accurate reports
- Online training has allowed more people to access training with limited training resources and has allowed training to continue during the pandemic
- Live plant specimens are an invaluable training resource
