




## **Agricultural Labour Factsheet**


Highlight: WHMs have increased back up to almost pre-COVID level since the borders reopened.


The gross value of agriculture production has steadily increased from \$63 billion in 2012-13 to \$94 billion in 2021-22.



The data reveals an initial upward trend in payroll jobs from January 2020 to December 2021, coinciding with the COVID-19 pandemic period. However, starting from 2022 when the borders reopened, there is a gradual decline in payroll jobs. Additionally, a seasonal pattern is observed, with job numbers peaking during the December period.


The total number of agricultural workers has slightly decreased from 255,100 people employed in May 2013 to 252,000 people employed in May 2023. The count includes owner managers of unincorporated enterprises, which are prevalent in agriculture industry, but they are not accounted for in the payroll jobs figures.

The number of working holiday makers declined steeply from 141,000 workers to 21,000 between COVID border closure and reopening. Since the border reopening, working holiday makers have increased back up to 137,000 as of May 2023.




Source: ABS The share of agriculture in the workforce has gradually declined since 2013, with agriculture making up 2.2 per cent of the workforce in February 2013 and falling to 1.8 per cent in May 2023.



The share of female workers in agriculture has fluctuated within a range of 29 per cent and 37 per cent.

There has been a steady decline in the number of hours worked in the agricultural sector since mid 2020.
