


INTRODUCTION

Working Together: Managing National Heritage Places has been developed to assist owners and managers of National Heritage places to better understand the management requirements for these places as set out under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (EPBC Act) and its Regulations. There are currently 79 National Heritage places which are located throughout Australia and its external territories. These include a variety of historic, Indigenous and natural places.

Once a place is included in the National Heritage List the owner and/or manager should aim to protect and conserve the National Heritage values of the place, along with its other heritage values.

The eight sections deal with a range of matters and have been colour coded for ease of reference. The section entitled *Caring for National Heritage places* highlights some of the common ownership and management arrangements of places on the List. The section entitled *Applying the principles* outlines the seven management principles which should be used to guide the day-to-day management of a place. A framework for developing a management plan, which meets the standards of the EPBC Act, is also provided in the section entitled *Developing management plans*.

From time to time managers and owners will need to make changes to a National Heritage place. The section entitled *Making a referral* explains the types of changes which may require a decision from the Federal Environment Minister under the EPBC Act. An overview of the referral process, including useful web links, is also provided.
