RACEHORSES FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM - LIFTING OF TEMPORARY FMD RESTRICTIONS

This Animal Biosecurity Policy Memorandum (ABPM) advises stakeholders of the lifting of the temporary foot and mouth disease (FMD) restrictions on importation of racehorses from the United Kingdom (UK), effective 6 July 2001.

On 14 March 2001 in response to the FMD outbreak in Europe, Australia temporarily suspended imports of livestock, including horses, and their products from the European Union (EU) and other countries where FMD is present. As part of the undertaking to review the suspension and make adjustments as necessary, interim conditions were announced on 17 May 2001 allowing the importation of horses from the EU, providing pre-export isolation is undertaken in a country that does not have a significant FMD outbreak. These conditions precluded the direct importation of horses, including racehorses, from Great Britain.

Following further review of the FMD situation in the UK and detailed inspections of pre-export quarantine (PEQ) facilities by a Veterinary Officer from the Australian Quarantine and Inspection Service (AQIS), the Director of Quarantine has approved the lifting of the FMD restrictions on the temporary importation of racehorses from the UK. This decision takes effect from 6 July 2001 and will allow racehorses residing and training in Great Britain to be imported to Australia temporarily for race meetings such as the Melbourne Cup.

Additional measures to be applied to the temporary importation of racehorses from the UK are attached and include such things as:

- the horses must not have been kept in premises classed as 'restricted' by the UK Department of Environment, Food and Regional Affairs in the 21 days before entering PEO;
- two-week mandatory PEQ at authorised facilities at least 10 kilometres from any FMD-infected property;
- cleaning and disinfection of horses and transport
- the horses to remain under quarantine surveillance in Australia at specified premises, following post arrival quarantine, until exported within 60 days.

Biosecurity Australia will continue to monitor the FMD outbreak in the UK with a view to the reviewing the temporary suspension for the permanent importation of horses residing in Great Britain.
