PLANT BIOSECURITY POLICY MEMORANDUM 2002/42

IMPORT RISK ANALYSIS – CITRUS FROM FLORIDA, USA

The purpose of this Plant Biosecurity Policy Memorandum (PBPM) is to notify you of the availability of a technical issues paper for the import risk analysis (IRA) on fresh citrus from Florida, USA.

PBPM 2001/05 of 16 March 2001 advised that Biosecurity Australia had received information requested from the USA in order to progress the IRA on fresh citrus from Florida.

A technical issues paper has been prepared for this IRA. The purpose of the technical issues paper is to provide information on the:

- biosecurity framework
- method for pest risk analysis
- proposal to import fresh citrus fruit from Florida
- preliminary results of pest categorisation and
- further steps in the IRA process.
