## COMMONWEALTH GOVERNMENT IMPLEMENTATION REPORT – 2000

#### Introduction

#### Context

The Tasmanian Regional Forest Agreement (RFA) was signed by the Prime Minister and the Tasmanian Premier on 8 November 1997. The Agreement is to remain in force for twenty years. Under the RFA there are two major monitoring and reporting requirements (clauses 44 and 45). For the first five years of the Agreement, the Commonwealth and Tasmania provide annual reports on the achievement of agreed undertakings, or milestones (set out in Attachment 3 of the RFA).

A performance review is to be undertaken during the last year of each five-year period. The first five-yearly review is scheduled for completion in November 2002.

### Commonwealth RFA implementation report for 2000

This is the third Commonwealth implementation report. It report provides information on Commonwealth action in 2000 towards implementation of the Tasmanian RFA, including progress on Commonwealth-specific milestones listed in Attachment 3 of the RFA, and the provision of Commonwealth funding committed to Tasmania under the RFA.

The main focus of this report is on those milestones due for completion by the Commonwealth during 2000. However for the sake of completeness the report lists all milestones for which the Commonwealth is responsible, and reports on the achievement of past milestones.

The Commonwealth has completed all of these milestones or has made significant progress towards their finalisation this year.

A separate report outlines action by the Tasmanian Government towards implementation of specific milestones for which they are responsible.

The aim is to ensure benefits arising from Australian certification, particularly through the development of the Australian Forestry Standard, will be optimal and promote access to international markets.
